


Chautauqua's Own Create Beautiful, Whimsical & Artistic Tablescapes




A Big Thanks!

Eighteenth Annual CHS Platform Lecture

Learn about the Revolutionary War battles that took place in St. Louis and the surrounding area on **Sunday, June 26 at 7 pm in the Auditorium.** Our guest will be local attorney and author Stephen L. Kling, Jr.

Kling is the author of several books on the American Revolutionary War in the West and co-curator of the recently opened American Revolutionary War in the West museum exhibit at the Heritage Museum in St. Peters, Missouri. He will speak about his 2017 book, *The Battle of St. Louis*, which was made into a historical documentary released late last year and won the St. Louis Filmmaker's award and a Mid-America Emmy. As a direct descendant of Joseph Robidoux, who was a member of the local St. Louis militia at the time of the St. Louis attack and who later became a prominent fur trader and merchant, Kling speaks with both academic and personal interest in the history of the region. The presentation will include some short videos on the museum exhibit and the documentary, and will cover some topics of local interest during the war. His books and DVDs of the documentary will be available for purchase following the presentation.




10:45 Lecture Series Brings Us General and President Ulysses S. Grant

Ulysses S. Grant is one of the most under-estimated heroes in our country. Despite his accomplishments, he was a difficult man to describe. Even his good friend, William T. Sherman said "He was an enigma even to himself." His life, both as President and as Commanding General, was filled with controversies, even to this day. In this program, two local investigative reporters will have a chance to dig into these controversies in a "no-holds-barred" interview with Grant himself, as portrayed by Larry Werline.


First Meeting of the Chautauqua Book Group

If you're lucky enough to be in the valley during the week, you have the opportunity to roll into the Town Hall and attend the (almost) weekly 10:45 am Lecture Series. The Lecture Series, which began in 2011, was conceived by Jim and Susan Seiber, pitched to the Program Committee and then given a weekly slot that fit right in on weekday mornings while the kids were participating in their own activities. And, bonus, it just happened to contribute perfectly to the "educational" aspect of Chautauqua. The very first lecture was off to the races with an audience of six and the subject, "History, Art and Culture of American Tribal-style Belly Dance." Since then, factoring in floods and COVID, approximately 105 lectures have been given—many from our own Chautauquans--on eclectic topics including, but not limited to: Fiction Writing & Publishing (Susan McBride), Chautauqua Creek Life (Betsy Dugan), The Forensics of Abraham Lincoln's Handwriting, How City Museum Got to Where It Is Today, Translating the Bible (Clint McCann), and Coal Mine Wars of the 1930's. According to Susan, lectures by Chautauquans are well attended and popular as well as anything with food; last summer, Trent and Laura Colbert's "Mexican Food You've Probably Never Heard Of," packed 'em in. This summer, some of the topics we can look forward to include: What It Takes To Be An Army Ranger, Climate Change and Solutions, and Food and Farming in the Future. Susan and Jim are quick to point out that "it takes a village;" that they've had great help making the series a success including support from the LCIA in the form of a projector and screen, reliable technically savvy Chautauquans who help speakers with things like PowerPoint and miking, residents who present or suggest lectures and volunteers who make coffee and clean up. Let's wrap this up by way of a perfect quote... Rose Tomlinson once told Susan, "I always come out of your lectures smarter than I went in!" How. Awesome. ~DW
