Race Heats will be divided by age groups and number of boaters (single or multiple). Age groups will be determined by the oldest boater in the boat.


Awards will be given for:

Events 6/7: 10 and 11 Girls/Boys Freestyle (1 width)

Events 8/9: 12-14 Girls/Boys Freestyle (2 widths)

Events 10/11: 15-20 Girls/Boys Freestyle (2 widths)

Events 12/13: 21-40 Women's/Men's Freestyle (2 widths)

Events 14/15: 41-70 Women's/Men's Freestyle (2 widths)

Events 16/17: 70 and over (Masters) Women's/Men's Pool Walk (4 width)

Events 18/19: 10 and older Women's/Men's Individual Medley (100 IM): (Butterfly/Backstroke/Breaststroke/Freestyle)

Relays: All relays are 4 widths total

Event 20: Medley Relay: (Backstroke/Breaststroke/Butterfly/Freestyle)

Event 21: Family Relay: (Freestyle - all swimmers must be descendents of the same set of grandparents. Spouses of descendents are included).

Event 22: Sweatshirt Relay (A Swim Classic classic! - this one needs no explanation!) Bring your own sweatshirt to represent your school or college.

Only one needed per team.

Notes: If we have a large number of swimmers in a given event, we may break it down into multiple heats with a final. The final will include top 3 finishers from each heat





Take a Moment to Remember Safety!

Smoke detectors & carbon monoxide detectors should be in each living space.

Fire extinguishers – have and service these in your cottage.

Mosquito bites – use heat to quickly relieve mosquito bite itch and swelling!

Spider bites – wash with soap and water, use ice and Benadryl to help the itching. Watch for signs of infection like red streaking and see a doctor if infection is present.

Ticks – use fine-tipped tweezers to slowly pull out the tick. Wash the bite area and your hands with soap and water.

Stings – remove the stinger, wash the site with soap and water, cover the site with a bandage and keep it clean.

Poison Ivy – the rash is caused by an allergic reaction to the oily resin urushiol. If exposed to poison ivy, wash skin and hands with soap and water and wash your clothing. Even dead poison ivy plants can have active urushiol.



AED (Automated External Defibrillator) units are used for cardiac arrest. Chautauqua has 2 AED units located:

o Pool lifeguard office

o Administration building, mounted on the outside wall on the right of the building as you face the front door.

Keep cool to prevent heat exhaustion and heat stroke. If someone experiences a heat-related illness, move the person out of the heat/sun, loosen clothing, apply cool wet cloth to skin, spray the person with cool water and fan them, have the person sip cool water.

Bikes – install a light on bikes and watch for people walking on the roads of Chautauqua.

Do You Know These Fun Facts About the Kentucky Home? By Chris Hagin



In 1999, Rose Tomlinson, as Chairperson of the Historical Society, put a request in the *Channels*. She invited anyone who was interested to come help create the Historical Society's new gift shop. Her hope was through the new shop they could generate enough funds to help save the Kentucky Home. The only one who came to help that day was **Chris Hagin**. Together they set to work creating the space that became The Jersey Door Boutique. As they worked, more people came to help, including but not limited to **Ellen Jackson**, **Charlie Meyer**, **Sue Laffler**, **Dottie Spence**, **and Judy Hurd**. They cleaned out the old kitchen, ancient bathroom and the adjoining areas including the Indian

Giver (now known as Tillie's). They rolled up old carpets, painted the floors, pitched the old clothes and other useless items. Walking over holes in the floor covered with wood planks and old doors, they cleaned the place out. They painted the walls and hung material on the ceilings to cover more holes. Rose and Chris dumpster-dived all the month of June, rescuing items that could be fixed up and resold. Rose even painted a giant area rug on the floor of the new boutique. The Jersey Door opened later that summer. With added help from both **Jenny Rausch and Becky Pyatt**, we opened to a record crowd and almost sold out in one day!

While cleaning out the old kitchen, **Chris Hagin, Rose Tomlinson and Ellen Jackson** came up with another idea for raising money for the Kentucky Home restoration. "What if we served food and coffee on the patio Saturday mornings?" The building originally housed the community restaurant, "let's bring that back". They realized they would need someone to run it and get it off the ground. They approached **Dottie Spence** with the idea and asked if she would run the restaurant for the first year. She did an amazing job. The first year was tough, they had to operate using the old kitchen and would pass food out the window to the patio. They were able to purchase dishes, glasses, silverware, etc. for the Pink Geranium (PG) and with help from many Chautauqua ladies the Pink Geranium was born. **Sue Laffler** helped run the Pink Geranium the following year and for several more years after that.

The success of both The Jersey Door and The Pink Geranium paved the way for the fundraising and awareness needed to breathe much needed life into a decrepit old building. **Jenny and Becky** became the main Jersey Door volunteers and were responsible for finding and purchasing all the merchandise and designing the wonderful t-shirts. The Jersey Door remained open until the fall of 2012 under the supervision of **Chris, Jenny and Becky.** Once the building was remodeled, the profits from the Jersey Door went into an account for a future archival center. The funds remain there today. As does the dream of one day having a proper space to house our important history. In 2012, the Historical Society turned the Jersey Door into what is today's Archival Research Center. The **Historical Society** turned over the management of the Pink Geranium to the **LCIA** in 2004 and it's still a big hit today.

Dave Hagin was responsible for the remodeling of the north side of the Kentucky Home. He donated all his time and labor to fix the rotting PG side, which included a lot of tear out, replacing structural supports and flooring, adding new wiring, new windows and doors, new plumbing, replacing the ceilings where needed. He and his crew also added a new restroom and kitchen, the much more efficient kitchen we have today. You can't walk the streets of Chautauqua without passing something that wasn't someone's labor of love. Whether it is donated time, donated money, donated hard labor, it is all around us. We are thankful every day for what we have and what we have come together as a community to accomplish.

From the Archives: Cottage Spotlight by Riley Mullarkey

My name is Riley Mullarkey, and I am this year's Chautauqua Historical Society Intern. I'd like to start this week off by thanking those of you who expressed your fondness of the last "Spotlight Cottage" in the previous issue of the *Channels*. I appreciate all the feedback I've received so far!

Without further ado, I present this week's Spotlight Cottage: 11 St. Louis Circle. While currently owned by the Holowatuk family, this cottage was built in 1911. The first recorded lease of this cottage was in September 1979, when the cottage was owned by Norma and Michael Cutler. According to lease records, the Cutlers owned this cottage until November 1989, when Robert and Sonja Willman purchased it. The cottage was entitled *Hollyhock*, and was sold to the Holowatuks in 1992, to which the cottage earned the title *Tuk Away*.



The **Willman's** portion of this cottage box is the reason it is the "Spotlight Cottage". Within this cottage box, I found an excerpt from *Better Homes and Gardens*, where 11 St. Louis Circle was featured. The article is entitled "Cottage Decorating" and it was written by Michelle Tibodeau. **Sonja Willman** was interviewed for this article, and it goes into detail about how to make your cottage *your* space. When I first came to Chautauqua, one of my favorite things to see was how people were able to make their cottages feel so much like a home away from home. For some, decorating a cottage may be extremely difficult, while others have no trouble at all.

"It's a place to put your feet up and do nothing or have a friend come by." was to me, the highlight of this article. The versatility of a cottage is what makes it different from an average home, but in the best way possible. Within this article, Willman also said, "Display fun stuff, forget true treasures," which I found so admirable. When we're not in Chautauqua and in our off-season homes, there's a completely different agenda when it comes to decorating. The way I see it is when I'm home, I present certain parts of my house for the aesthetic of other people, whereas I find myself doing things the way I find most appealing when I'm in Chautauqua. Willman added, "Recall Grandma's house," and while many of us may have just thought of our actual grandparents, I thought about the warmth that a grandmother may portray, which of course brings me back to generally thinking about Chautauqua as a whole.

I'm sure a majority of us find ourselves struggling to explain Chautauqua to people that have never been, and this article seemed to showcase everything I've struggled to explain to people with ease. Maybe it's the comfort portrayed in the photos, or just the thought of my cottage, but the magic of Chautauqua radiates throughout this magazine article. **Sonja Willman** positively impacted so many people, and while I was never given the opportunity, it's quite an incredible thing to see someone's passions beaming through a quick magazine interview so clearly and thoroughly.
